Castlewood Forest: Celebrating generations of neighbors, nature

Original owners affectionately describe our neighborhood as "out in the boon docks," when it emerged as a peaceful haven in the 1960s and 70s. The neighborhood was crafted by visionary developer Don West, who joined with builders L.A. Felder, Don Leach, and Art Thompson to realize his dream of energy-

efficient homes nestled in nature—a concept ahead of its time. West's love for preservation reached beyond Castlewood to historic Gruene, Texas, where he famously restored landmarks like Gruene Hall and the Gruene Mansion, rekindling the town's 1880s charm.

For early residents, Monarch Drive served as the single entryway, adding to the feeling of seclusion, with many neighbors recalling the occasional stray cow wandering past their homes. Its appeal drew families stationed at the nearby Bergstrom Air Force Base, many of whom have stayed on. Today, retired military men and women are still a proud part of Castlewood and Oak Valley. Generations of families have grown up here, making memories over evening strolls, backyard barbecues, and under the expansive, shady oaks.

That strong community spirit was fully evident in 1993, when oak wilt threatened Castlewood's treasured trees. Residents rallied together, volunteering and fundraising to save them. This is when COVNA, the neighborhood

association was born! In partnership with Texas A&M Forest Service, they developed an innovative oak wilt prevention project that became a model for the state, preserving countless trees across Texas. This collective effort reflected the neighborhood's heart and commitment to preserving its natural beauty.

While Castlewood is no longer "out in the boon docks," it remains a beloved blend of longtime residents and new families drawn to its warmth, history, and charm. The neighborhood's iconic streets

have even caught Hollywood's eye, appearing recently in HBO's *Love and Death* and other productions.

In honor of Castlewood's legacy, I'm gathering memories, stories, photos, and video interviews that capture our neighborhood's rich history. Within the past few months the City Council has hired a new City Manager, T.C.Broadnax, and a new Chief of Police, Lisa Davis. They attended the ANC meetings to share their vision regarding their service to the Austin community. To better understand the concerns of our neighborhoods, the city
